Starting as a tiny stream in north Georgia, the Chattahoochee flows south to Alabama and Florida, meeting the Flint River and flowing into the Apalachicola Bay. The Chattahoochee River watershed above Atlanta is the smallest in the nation serving a major metropolitan area: 3.5 million people in metro Atlanta depend on the Chattahoochee for water supply. In the next 20 years, this population will nearly double, placing greater demands on our tiny watershed.

Plant Smart ☐ Use native, drought-tolerant landscaping	Cut outdoor water use 90%
Water Smart ☐ Water in the evening or early morning hours instead of the middle of the day	Cut total water use by 10%
☐ Use drip irrigation or micro sprays instead of sprinklers	Cut outdoor water use 75%
☐ Use rainbarrels and cisterns to capture rain and rooftop runoff for reuse	Cut outdoor water use 100%
